Same context, different definitions.



Two children with additional needs may not necessarily have the same expectations of what gives them a sense of inclusion.

For example, Child A, living with an amputated leg, feels empowered when he is able to walk around with a leg prosthesis. He hates it when he is offered a wheelchair.

However, Child B who is also a leg amputee, may not necessarily feel the same. He may be struggling with other conditions that makes walking around with a prosthesis challenging. Thus, he appreciates the aid of a wheelchair, and when his family members help him to move around.

"Seek to understand their needs and expectations and avoid forcing our opinion on them."

- 1) Since each child with additional needs can be unique, what about the family's needs or expectations?
- 2) What small steps can we take to understand a family's needs and expectations?

As key advocates in their child's inclusion journey, caregivers are part of the team that helps create learning opportunities for their child to maximise his or her potential.



Caregivers, educators and support professionals (e.g., learning support educators, therapists) can work together to come up with common goals and objectives based on family priorities. This helps to ensure consistency in the home and school environment for the child to work on identified skills and achieve independence.
